

#### **DIRECTOR'S LETTER**

with Emily Benedix, Executive Director

When 2023 began, I couldn't have anticipated some of the changes we saw. From staff changes, a continued rise in antisemitism, and the horrific terror attack of October 7 and all the chaos that has followed for the Jewish people.

What I could have predicted is that our community, leadership, and Federation staff would continue to step up to ensure needs were met, and continued support for our Jewish community. Offering what many of us have known all along, Jewish communities are the supporting pillar for Jewish lives, in times of joy, growth, mourning, and uncertainty.

Co-Presidents Judy Katz and Dr. Mark Sperling have been invaluable partners, helping me navigate my 2nd year of service but also, providing a sounding board and support when approaching unexpected challenges. Our board has overseen the changes we've made to better serve our community. Our programming committee chairs have worked tirelessly to provide programming, review our services, and support our staff with their passion, ideas, and time. Our building co-chairs have worked with us to face the challenges of an aging building, ensuring that we have a safe and welcoming Federation to gather at. Our financial committees have been diligent in their oversight, helping us ensure that donor dollars are efficiently and responsibly used to meet our greatest needs.

At the center of all of the action is the amazing team we have here at the Federation. I am proud of the team we have. I am not only proud to share our success of the last year, but I'm excited to see what we will accomplish in 2024.

Last year I thanked Vicky Odegaard for her expertise in finance as our Accountant. This year I am excited to thank her as our Director of Operations. Also joining our team, Samantha Meyer joined our team as Marketing and Communications Associate, quickly demonstrating her design skills, and stepping up to assist with programming whenever needed.

K'Ton Ton saw the biggest change with the departure of Director Erin Nowakowski. Teacher Bailey Hoffman stepped in to fill the role and thanks to her experience and existing relationships with our parents, we have had a smooth transition for our students. Our teachers and assistants continue to make our classrooms warm and welcoming. Rachel Sieffert and Trevor Biancardi returned as our directors for a successful summer of JCY Camp. Additionally, we've welcomed Jack Boglioli as our cook for Federation programming, and Monica Vega Vazquez as our facilities associate.

I have always felt that the success or downfall of any organization is in the team that carries it. As a Jewish Federation, that team doesn't stop at the staff list. Our team includes the board, committee members, volunteers, and community leadership as a whole. There are no words to express my gratitude for the support of everyone on our team and look forward to all we will accomplish in the coming year.

#### REFLECTIONS OF A PRESIDENCY

#### with Judy Katz, Outgoing Co-President

Recently, I found the comments that I had made four years ago when I became President of our Federation for a two-year term. I'm very happy that I was able to take an active part of Federation. I specifically agreed to continue for the extra years because I could see that having continuity in the leadership would be helpful, as we hired our new Executive Director, Emily Benedix, who has now been with us almost two years. It has been extremely gratifying to see Emily put together a very competent staff that truly works as a team. Emily and Vicky, our Director of Operations, along with our Board Treasurer, Alan Lahn, have organized our finances to a place where they've never been since I've been on the Board of Directors. Our staff including Patti, Rachel, Samantha, and Lindsay have been doing a terrific job helping community members and developing excellent programs.

A big thank you to my two co-presidents these past two years. First, in 2022 Barbara Waxman agreed to serve again as president at a time when our Federation required a leader to help us get through some trying times. And, she sure did that! Then this past year I had the pleasure of serving as co-president with Mark Sperling, who brought a lot of life experiences to our Board of Directors. I know that Mark will do a great job, as he continues his presidency.

The past four years included dealing with the Covid pandemic and integrating zoom technology, so we could keep offering programs. While that was not an ideal way to meet, our community was able to stay in touch. We were able to keep all of our staff working at that time, and one of the most meaningful projects we did was having volunteers step up to deliver meals to many of our senior community members. We even had zoom programs for our annual campaign!

Our Building Committee co-chairs, John Doherty and Janine Rothschild have worked diligently to make sure our building and grounds are well-maintained and safe. Jonathan Radnor, our Endowment Committee chair and his committee has kept a close eye on our Federation's investments these past years. Our Governance Committee under the leadership of chair, Dana Kaplan, continues to offer proposals for our policies handbooks and proposes nominations for our Board of Director officers and directors.

Our Jewish Community Services offers programs and services for all generations. Laurie Young and Marilyn Hirsch, committee chairs, have been instrumental in overseeing changes to these well-received programs.

Thankfully, we were able to start meeting in person again in 2022 and have slowly built up our in-person programs. While it took some time for community members to feel comfortable coming to the building, I'm now happy to say we're operating many meaningful programs including our ever-popular Book Club led by Carol Culberg and several very interesting Israel-related programs including last February's Tu B'Shevat Seder and our annual Israel Solidarity Day under the leadership of Miriam Marcus, our Israel Awareness Committee chair. Our Jewish Community Relations Committee under the leadership of Rosalie Levinson continues to organize programs to reach out to the interfaith community including a discussion about the Abraham Accords this past September. They have also offered a well-attended program about Antisemitism and Hate to area high school and university leaders and started developing a relationship with local universities.

For me personally the most meaningful program we offered this past year was our Solidarity with Israel evening just four days after the horrible October 7 massacre in Israel by Hamas and Islamic terrorists. Over 180 people came together to pray and show their support for Israel.

These last two months have been difficult for me, as I mourn what has happened in Israel. I am so thankful to our community members who donated to Jewish Federations of North America's Israel Emergency Fund. Our

Federation contributed \$10,000 and the community has donated over \$20,000. It is so heartwarming to see how we have joined together to support our brethren in Israel.

Lastly, I can't end without thanking those of you who have already donated to our 2023 Annual Campaign and reminding those of you who have not yet done so, that there is still time to donate and support all of the wonderful things that our Federation does.

I hope to see many of you at upcoming Federation programs.

#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

with Dr. Mark B. Sperling, President

Last year, we had the opportunity to be in Warsaw Poland, and visit three of the concentration camps and the Warsaw Ghetto Museum among other places. Even though I have been a student of history for many years, I learned so much through that visit about the suffering of our people. Thus, I am very honored to continue as the President of the Jewish Federation of Northwest Indiana during one of the most difficult periods in Jewish History. We know that in every generation we have been attacked verbally and with weapons. The events starting on October 7 where thousands of innocent people including Holocaust survivors, and families including children and babies were wounded, killed, or taken hostage. Our Federation community has stood strong in its support for the State of Israel and its people through its solidarity gathering and very generous donations that followed that event here.

It's a difficult time in the United States with rising antisemitism and violence in cities, towns, and large college campuses. I am so fortunate to be a faculty member at Indiana University Northwest where our administrative team has worked diligently to have academic conversations with students, staff, and faculty surrounding the damage that has been done in Israel and Gaza. We also know that so many people living in Gaza and Israel, both Jewish and non-Jewish have been victims of the ongoing Hamas attacks. It should not be surprising that Israel is and will fight back and not sit and wait for more violence that hurts its people to continue. Unfortunately, the price is a mighty one for every Jew regardless of where in the world we live and work.

No one should be surprised that our Federation along with others will do everything in our power to educate our citizens through our programming that constructive discussion with local Islamic leaders and others can bring about a much better understanding as to what is at stake here.

This is quite a time to be President of the Jewish Federation. I along with the other Officers, Board, and Staff members carry the mantle of peace in our community, the mantle of constructive discussion, and the mantle of support for the State of Israel. History teaches us that Jews were in the Middle East long before anyone else lived there, regardless of what we hear on television, radio, or read in the newspapers. It's the job of journalists to be fair in reporting, not take sides, but sadly that's not what we have been exposed to in recent years.

I will strive to be your representative for what is good and right for our Federation during my term of office. I look forward to Board discussions that allow for our community to work together for a common good, At this time, I would like to thank Judy, Barry, Barbara, and others who have mentored me as I became a member and then officer of the Board. I am very appreciative of having the honor to serve and support the excellent efforts of our Executive Director even in this most difficult time, and I pledge to do my best to represent our Federation In the most positive light and work closely with our Board and Staff to present programs and messages of interest and education for our community.

The Israel Awareness Committee sponsored several Zoom discussions this past year beginning with a very interesting program with a couple who survived the Entebbe rescue.

In February we hosted a fun, educational Tu B'Shevat Seder for all community families. We had two shinshinim spend that weekend with us, and they did a great job leading the seder.

Our annual Israel Solidarity Day was enjoyed by many in our community. We had the honor of hosting four retired IDF officers who shared their stories with us, and we were treated to a sing-along with our local congregation vocalists. Two Shinshinim also joined us for the weekend. Community members provided photos of Israel that were displayed in the social hall.

October 7 was the worst day anyone could have ever imagined for the state of Israel when thousands of Hamas and Islamic terrorists infiltrated Israel. Our committee and Federation have tried to keep the community informed and updated. The committee worked with the JCS committee to plan a very important, meaningful Solidarity with Israel program.

In November we co-hosted a Zoom about the current situation in Israel with the Jewish Federations of St. Joseph Valley and Fort Wayne, hearing from Dan Feferman, a national security analyst, and Khaled Abu Toameh, an Arab Israeli journalist.

Because of the great relationship that we have with the Jewish Agency in Chicago, we had a third visit by Shinshinim in early December. They had Shabbat dinner with our Noar and Atid teen groups and spent a morning with our MASA Sunday school students.





#### JEWISH COMMUNITY RELATIONS COMMITTEE

JCRC sponsored four programs this year.

In February we joined IUNW in presenting the documentary Shared Legacy, which traced Jewish/Black relations from the 1960s until today. Robin Rich, who co-chairs the Interfaith Action Network, described Black/Jewish relations in NW Indiana in the 50s and 60s and we learned about the current work of her organization.

In May, we brought speakers from the American Jewish Committee to train Northwest Indiana educational and civic leaders on understanding and combating antisemitism in their communities. The focus was on how local community leaders can actively work to respond to the recent surge in antisemitism. Also, a 5-year Jewish holiday calendar, which included Indiana's mandate to teach about the Holocaust, was prepared and distributed to the 40 leaders who attended. In September we celebrated the third anniversary of the signing of the Abraham Accords. The Deputy Consul General of Israel to the Midwest and the Regional Director of the American Jewish Committee discussed the importance of the Accords in achieving peace in the Middle East.

And on November 27, JCRC Chair Rosalie Levinson presented a program for IUN students and community members addressing the horrific surge in antisemitism and anti-Zionism since October 7, followed by her telling her parents' Holocaust stories.

#### SOCIAL SERVICES---BY THE NUMBERS

The Jewish Federation Community Service department provides caring and professional social service to all of our community members in Northwest Indiana. However, 2023 has been all about Change for the Jewish Community Service Program. We began in late spring by closing our physical food pantry and moving to a "Gift Card" model. JCS clients are now able to receive gift cards to purchase what their family needs most, including fresh and perishable food items, hygiene products, and paper goods at the store of their choice. We also promoted our administrative associate, Patti Anderson, to be in charge of all intake forms and client calls. Patti's friendly personality and caring nature are a perfect fit for JCS clients who just need an ear. Services that JCS continues to provide are AFC meals to homebound community members, emergency utility and rent assistance, medical expense reimbursements, a peer-supported grief group, home and hospital visits to the sick, senior safety programs, and referrals to local social service agencies.

Any of our community members are welcome to request assistance. Remember, we are here to help!





" After transferring \$55,000 to the Federation operating budget, the value of the Jewish Federation endowments, as of November 16, 2023, was \$7,265,175 versus \$7,094,007,000 on December 31, 2023. Our portfolio has increased \$174,168 during this fiscal year.
